Parents, too, were filled with emotions as they prepared to send their children off for another year of learning.





Keep your words soft and sweet; you never know when you may have to eat them!

Fall is a good time for casseroles!

Mom's Chicken Casserole

2 c. cooked, diced chicken ½ lb. Velveeta or 2 c. macaroni (uncooked) American cheese 1 can cream of chicken soup

1 onion, grated 1 can cream of mushroom soup Salt & pepper to taste

Mix soups and milk. Combine with remaining ingrediets and mix well. Let stand in refrigerator overnight or for 5 to 6 hours. Place mixture in a 9x13 inch pan. Cover with aluminum foil and

bake at 350 degrees for 60-70 minutes. Tuna or ham could be used instead of the chicken.

Zucchini Brownies

2 c. ground zucchini 1½ c. sugar ½ c. vegetable oil ½ c. nuts (chopped)

1/2 tsp. salt 1½ tsp. baking soda (No Eggs!)

Sift together flour, salt, baking soda and cocoa. Combine with the rest of the ingredients and stir. Transfer to a greased 9x13 inch pan. Bake at 325-350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes or until done. Good with or without frosting!


WOODS CELEBRATE 65 YEARS

In addition to her love of gardening and antiques, Donna was an aficionado of all things fiber art; she was a master of crochet, knitting, and cross-stitch. Her memory lives on in the numerous afghans, cross-stitch tapestries, and transplanted perennials bestowed upon her loved ones. We'd like to think that Donna is already busy sewing some beautiful new projects in Heaven.

Above all else, Donna's greatest loves were her children and grandchildren. She concluded every visit by telling them she loved them, and then planting multiple kisses on their cheeks.

The reunion is sponsored by the Fairbank Historical Society, Fairbank American Legion, and Fairbank Food Center.





Wapsie Valley's historic season closed with a substate championship game appearance and plenty of accolades from the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association.

Three seniors were named to the Class 1A All-Northeast District first team, with three other players named to the second team.

Traeton Sauerbrei was named firstteam pitcher, with Jacob Schoer selected first-team outfielder and Tucker Ladeburg selected to a firstteam utility spot.

Sauerbrei went 9-1 in 10 starts, with a 2.10 earned-run average in 50 innings. He struck out 59 in his return to the program after a season off.

Ladeburg went 4-1 with three saves and a 1.94 ERA in 43 1/3 innings in his

final season before playing at Wartburg. He struck out 60. Ladeburg batted .421 (51 for 121) with a teamhigh 53 runs batted in, 30 runs scored, 21 walks and a team-best five home

He was named first team utility last season, as well.

Schoer, a Simpson College commit, batted a team-best .444 (55 for 124). He drove in 52, scored 39 runs, stole 20 bases and drew 20 walks.

"Being named first team all-district is always a good thing," said Schoer, who was second team all-district last season. "This just shows the amount of success each of our teammates had individually made our team that much more successful. I will always remember the memories and success this team brought into my life."

Bryar Bellis (outfielder), Hunter Curley (pitcher) and Manny Huebner (second baseman) were selected to the second team.

Bellis batted .366 (45 for 123). He scored 51 runs, stole 30 bases, walked 28 times, drove in 25 and hit a teamhigh four triples.

"Being named second team is a
