Welsh Building's history remains with renovation

It's almost unrecognizable following John Welsh's extensive year-long renovation of his grandparent's historical 1897 Cafe that sits prominently in Fairbank's downtown corridor.

New windows, ceiling, several roof repairs, floor beams, stair relocation — the whole works and a ton of blood, sweat and tears transformed the space that John knew when he was young and as a space that housed antiques collected by his grandparents, Morris and Wilma. For over 20 years, the building, located at 115 Main Street East, housed items of the past as plans were building in John's mind that would change the Cafe's foreseeable future.

"I think a lot of the wow factor is the before and after with all the glass," John said. "When I finally decided to rip the front of this

out [the facade], we did it three days before Fairbank Days and it tore the whole front of the store open and I built a temporary wall in there."

The old windows and awning that was once there is no longer as the building joined the modernity that is today with large glass black-framed windows that let in the perfect amount of sunshine into the large, homey space. The iconic red brick, both tuck-pointed and relaid by John when necessary, remains in all its red glory.

Welsh Construction, John's main business, had quite a large task at hand. The building was set for renovation following the award of a \$100,000 Iowa Economic Development **Authority Community Catalyst** Building Remediation grant and a city match of \$75,000. The building was so well done that the IEDA wanted to feature the property in the next year's statewide Catalyst training as well.

The building wrapped up the final touches put on the by the new owner Tami Pries of The Farmer's Kitchen, a new restaurant to be coming to Fairbank in June featuring breakfast, lunch, bakery items and more. The Buchanan County Economic Development Commission provided Tami \$25K towards in a revolving loan fund.

Tami came into the picture here maybe six months ago," he said. "She came and proposed what she's got going on, and

we though it'd be a good fit. I think it would be great for the town. She's going to offer a lot of things that I think the town needs and will enjoy."

A residential general contractor by trade, John was up to the task to give the building its glory back - and as the grandson of the building's owners, who have supported John in his journey.

"They're excited to see it back open and what we'd done with it," John said.

With a project as large as this being completed in a year, and the details put in to restore some of the historical features, it's almost unbelievable the transformation.

John said he managed to keep the main features of the old shop to bring back the history: sanding and polishing old marble countertops, refinishing the floor, the old bar and counter and turning the old elevator space into a new restroom.

Refurbishing items was at the forefront to help in cost savings. John said he travelled to La Crosse, Wis., to retrieve Marriott booths that were reupholstered with brown fabrics that fit with Tami's farmhouse style.

New accents and a fresh feel didn't distract from the love put into the building that will assist in the creation of many memories from passersby, Fairbank citizens and those looking for ice cream on a hot summer's

"I'm excited to have it done, but it was also a great project," John said. "It was nerve wracking at times, but it was fun."





Wapsie Valley breaks records, snags points at 1A meet

DES MOINES — Jaylin May waited until it was over to cry.

Wapsie Valley's Wartburg-bound senior teared up around 3 p.m. Saturday after the Class 1A 400-meter relay ended with senior anchor Peyton Curley hitting the line and the Warriors clocking 50.96 seconds to place fifth. Curley earned her third consecutive top-5 400 relay medal while May earned her second; Wapsie was fourth in 2023 and third last season.

Curley tried to not stare at May for too long to avoid crying herself while hugging teammates Austin Franck and Haley Stu-

A day earlier they clocked 44.01 while qualifying for the final two hours after placing sixth in the 800 relay behind the same quartet. They ran in the same order for the 800 — Stuber, May, Franck, Curley - and clocked 1:47.37, five-thousandths of a second behind Council Bluffs St. Albert

"I think we were all determined to get a medal this year," Curley said of that race. "Austin and Haley stepped in in the beginning of the season for us and they were a great addition. We all worked well togeth-

The 800 relay hit a season-best mark by a second.

"It's crazy. I think the adrenaline really helped us a lot," May said. "Knowing that was me and Peyton's last 4x2, we just had to give it our all. Kinda sad, but I'm glad we made it this far."

May's only foray into the 100 dash finals also produced a personal record (12.53) to place sixth. It was .02 seconds behind fifth and .06 ahead of seventh. She ran out of lane 1, right against the rail.

"I always have a really good start; I just need to work on holding it out, and I think that was one of the best (I've done)," she said after that race. "And I did PR, so that was really fun. I'm just happy I got to experience another high school 100 one more time. I really enjoyed it."

May offhandedly remarked she nearly became emotional halfway through the

"As I was running, yeah," May laughed. "About halfway through, I was going through the motions and was locked in.

"Then I was like, 'Oh my gosh. This is my last open 100 ever in high school.' As I was running. I thought I should enjoy it more."

Adalynn Kane placed 18th in the 1,500 in 5:05.97 while the rest of the girls' relay entries placed within the top 20.

The Warriors collected 10 points to tie for 28th on the girls side.

The boys scored four to tie for 41st. The 800 relay placed sixth in 1:30.64, while the 400 relay (44.23) placed eighth.

The 400 was .02 off seventh and the 800 was .03 off fifth.

"I thought I had him. That was stressful," senior Weston Schares said after the 800.

Schares also praised his 400 teammates. Braden Bantz, Bryar Bellis and fellow senior Brayden Dana ran the 400.

"It's a medal. It's nice to be here, too, running on the last day," Schares said. "The last two years, I think we got ninth and 10th, which was kind of a bummer. But it was fun to finally get a medal.'

The 800 was Bantz, Schares, Cadyn Dana and Kiptyn Cox.

"A lot of work on handoffs. That was our big thing," Schares said. "If you want to go top eight, you have to have really good handoffs.

The other three relays placed between 10-14 while Bellis (100, 20), Garet Shannon (110 hurdles, 21) and Hayden Hilsenbeck (23, discus) placed in the top 25. Schares was 12th in the 200.

Senior Hayden Szurley won four top-3 medals in the para-ambulatory running events as head coach Justin Davie smiled from ear to ear after every race. Szurley ran 15.36 in the 100, 31.87 in the 200, 1:10.73 in the 400 and 2:52.35 in the 800 across all three days.

Wapsie Valley third grade students visit the Mississippi River Museum

Wapsie Valley third grade students had an exciting fun-filled day learning at the Mississippi River Museum. They are so thankful that the Wapsie Valley Education Foundation funded their trip. Students were able to touch stingrays with two fingers. They felt slimy and smooth. Other animals that amazed them were the octopus, Big Mama the alligator, and the otters! Otters are able to recognize their caregivers, and when they see them they do flips. They learned how turtles flirt with each other by waving their claws into the other turtle's face.

Students also enjoyed a tour of the William Black Dredge, which was in service

from 1934-1973. It was made from scratch in only 3 months. Women were not allowed to work on the boat, it was a superstition that if a girl was on the boat, it would sink. They worked long hours during the week, so on Friday, if they deserved a treat, they would have a fish fry and homemade ice cream. This dredge would burn up to 7,000 gallons of oil daily. The Black was capable of dredging 80,000 cubic yards of material per day.

The museum challenged us to pick up one piece of trash a day. This will help protect wildlife from eating trash or plastic that harm them. We all need to do our part to help our environment.







The Game of Life...

At the end of each year, I have had the pleasure of partnering with Mr. Murphy, Mrs. Nitz, and other Wapsie Valley staff to host a "Game of Life" experience for our High School Seniors. The point of the game for the students preparing to enter their college and workforce careers is to experience the cost of everyday decisions and to get clarity on the differences between "needs" vs. "wants" when it comes to their spending. This was our third year and each group that participates is different, and has their own unique experiences. Our hope is that they gain a few valuable ideas that may help set them up to create a stronger financial foundation. When our kids and our communities are financially stable and confident, we all thrive!

About two weeks before the game, the kids are asked to select their top three ideal professions. From there, a bunch of work begins behind the scenes to gather income, student loan expenses, and other data to generate a "starting salary" for each specific scenario. The seniors also have a randomly generated personal life as it relates to marriage, divorce, kids, child support, pets, etc, baking the appropriate expenses into their scenarios.

The morning of the game, the seniors are each given their synopsis: "Here is your life!" This is one of my favorite parts...for a few minutes they all digest the scenario they've been given and proclaim whether or not they have a fair hand before the game has even started. It's a chaotic few minutes but it is funny to sit back and listen.

To begin, their first stop is the bank. The kids are expected to write checks and to balance their accounts after deducting taxes and a student loan payment. From there, they move on to their big purchases: a home, a vehicle, the insurances for the home and vehicle, as well as health, and life insurances. After those stops *and a few mild meltdowns* they can move into smaller purchases – like childcare – Ha! The bills never stop coming!

There are also tables for subscriptions, convenience store purchases, utilities, clothing, and charitable giving. We have amazing volunteers* who come every year to help work each station and sometimes even try to upsell the kids as a salesperson would in real life. Going face-to-face with a salesperson can be its own learning experience. Of all the tables, there is one very important table: the S.O.S. At any time, the kids can veer away from the game and seek help if they're in a pickle. Lasty there are "fate" and "cop" cards where our volunteers arbitrarily stop by to hand out random expenses that life throws at us.

Afterwards, the students come do a short, post-game-debrief with me. We talk about budgeting, saving, and investing (if they have any money left to invest). We discuss how it's easier to pay yourself first instead of scraping up leftovers at the end of the month and bounce around ideas of how to do that without feeling like you're eating into a comfortable lifestyle. We also talk extensively about advocating for yourself. There are almost always solutions to problems without letting the stress of money degrade your sense of self-worth. Some solutions are easy, some are complex, but ALWAYS advocate for yourself and ask questions. Maybe you need to sell that brand new truck you bought and buy a used mid-sized car. Maybe you need to cancel a few subscriptions or sell that designer bag you bought. Maybe you even need to pick up a second job. Anything to gain traction, get your feet back under you, and win the game! It is so fun to listen to their comments, let them brainstorm, and sometimes just watch them try to process how much your decisions can impact your confidence and comfort financially.

We raise a good crop of great kids in our small communities and if we continue to support them, there is no limit to what they can achieve and give back to the community! Happy last month of school to our WV seniors!! Go make the most of the opportunities in front of you and don't forget your roots!


