WAPSIE VALLEY EDUCATION FOUNDATION Celebrating its 20th year in 2022

From the very beginning, the Wapsie Valley Education Foundation was formed to promote educational excellence by serving as an organization with the ability to accept contributions, gifts, and bequests. It was set up "for the kids" by being able to provide funds to teachers for projects, equipment, and curriculum enhancements not normally funded by the school budget. Funding from WVEF

is divided into two categories: 1) classroom enrichment grants and 2) scholarships for graduating seniors. The following will focus on the classroom enrichment grants.

How does an enrichment grant begin: Through an application submitted by a teacher or a team of teachers from any building within the WV Community School District. In January following the dinner/auction that

is the foundation's primary fund raiser, the superintendent and/or principals within the district gather the grant applications.

The guidelines to apply are as follows: "We (WVEF) are looking for projects that teachers have always wanted to do; but have not had the funds to do so. The projects must, however, be an integral part of the curriculum and

The Welsh's have donated many other items in the past, including their extensive knowledge of Fairbank's past.




Family gathering to celebrate Westpfahl's 60th anniversary

Parkview Residents enjoy Bible Study/Book Club

This past summer, the residents at Parkview and former maintenance man Bubba Seemann, formed a Bible Study / Book Club. For their first study they chose to work their way through "The Unexpected Journey" by Thom Rainer.

The book is a series of interviews with 13 different people who came from some other belief system or religion other than Christianity, and somehow came to put their trust & faith in Jesus. They read a chapter every week and met on Thursday nights to discuss. Delicious treats were provided at the conclusion of each night by long time Parkview employee Sarah Seemann.

The overwhelming consensus of the group is that no one is too far gone to come to Jesus and have a dramatically changed life!

"This book is one of the most encouraging books I've ever read!" says Bubba. "It reminds us all that anyone can respond to the good news of Jesus Christ, even those who may seem like there is no hope for. Like satan worshippers or angry black muslims who hate white christians (both are in the book). God can do more than we can ask or imagine, and that's a message we all need to hear."

This fall, the group will be studying the book and film "The Case For Christ," an in-

depth look into the life of former atheist Lee Strobel who was an award winning journalist with the Chicago Tribune who set out to disprove multiple aspects of Christianity when his wife came to faith in Jesus.

Lee Strobel used all his resources as a journalist and tried to disprove the resurrection of Jesus, the reliability of the Bible and the divinity of Jesus himself. Needless to say, he did not succeed. He eventually had no choice as he looked at all the evidence of his own research and acknowledged the fact that he had made quite a case FOR, not against, Jesus Christ. And the rest is history. Fairbank Fire Dept. makes donation to "Lilac Project"

The Fairbank Fire and EMS Association on Sept. 23 donated over \$1,800 in proceeds from the Pat Shannon Memorial Euchre Tournament in March to the the Lilac Project, a dementia awareness project of 2021 Buchanan County Fair Queen Courtney Schmitz. The project funds activity kits to help nursing home residents reflect on former occupations and hobbies.

"I started the Lilac Project to raise awareness about dementia and honor my grandma, Rhonda Rochford, who passed away in 2020," said Schmitz, the 2020 Miss Fairbank.

During her reign as the 2021 Buchanan County Fair Queen, former Miss Fairbank Schmitz raised close to \$10,000, then prepared memory boxes, games and other activities to distribute to five area nursing homes.

"I was able to deliver all 90 boxes this past June and it was easily the most rewarding experience of my life!" Schmitz said. "I only got to meet a few residents, but the ones that I did meet were very excited and grateful."

The fire association started the memorial card tournament in 2016, the year the Fairbank Fire Department lost 15-year member Pat Shannon to cancer. Shannon served the department as a firefighter and EMT from 1988 to 2003.

The association has hosted the card game in his memory, typically the Saturday before Saint Patrick's Day, not to raise money for the department, but rather to fund charitable organizations or individuals in the community who are suffer-

ing or in need, Fire Association President Jason Kayser said.

"In the six years we've been doing the euchre tournament it has been a tremendous success and well attended event," Kayser said. "The Fairbank Fire and EMS Association and the Fairbank Fire Department strongly believe community outreach and all around assistance to our community absolutely fits into our mission of keeping the community safe, and educated on safety and health," Kayser said.

Kayser said the membership overwhelmingly supported giving this year's donations from the Pat Shannon Euchre Tournament to Courtney's foundation, the Lilac Project.

"Courtney's mother, Rhonda worked at the health clinic here in Fairbank, and many times would be there to aid our ambulance when called to that facility," Kayser said, alluding to MercyOne Fairbank Family Medicine. "We are honored to support this endeavor," Kayser said.

When Schmitz got the call that the Fairbank Fire Department wanted to donate to the Lilac Project, "I was so excited!" she said. "I am blessed to live in a community that has been so supportive of my project."

The memory boxes Schmitz makes are filled with activities that remind residents of their former occupations and hobbies. "The boxes are themed and filled with all sorts of activities that will help them remember what they used to love," she said. Schmitz says it costs around \$150 dollars to make one box, but some vary in price. Kits are created, she said, "based on what the nursing homes were needing."

"I haven't looked much into tailoring each box to a specific person, but if I was asked to, I would help guide them," she said. "The money that is donated to me goes directly to the residents and projects that will benefit them," Schmitz said. "I am not an official nonprofit, but I am looking into it."

Financial donations can be mailed or dropped off at any Northeast Security Bank location. "There is a fund set up, the checks are made out to the Lilac Project on the top line," she said.

Schmitz periodically updates The Lilac Project Facebook page. Although Schmitz said the project is not related to anything she is studying for school, one of her programs of study at Hawkeye Community College is marketing management, and promoting the Lilac Project may provide transferable experience into marketing for a nonprofit.

"I just have a passion for making a difference," Schmitz said.

must demonstrate excellence in education.” The funds may be used for but are not limited to equipment, materials, supplies, and enrichment activities. Funds may not be used for salaries. All applications must have a letter of support from administration.

Who reviews the grant applications? Wapsie Valley Education Foundation board members with the superintendent and/or principals available for questions and input.

Are all the grants given funding? Unfortunately, no. Last year, teachers applied for grants totaling just over \$40,000. We had \$22,000.00 in funds to allocate. Many grants received partial funding; a few received full funding; and there were grants that received no funding.

So how do you decide who gets the money? That’s the tough part. In a perfect world, we would grant all applications 100% of the funding applied for, but it isn’t perfect. We work with the funds available.

We look at applications submitted from the elementary buildings, the rural schools, and the junior/senior high level. We look at the number of students that benefit. We ask if there is any possibility that the district can assist with funding part of the grant application. We look at keeping equipment and technology in the classroom, including science, shop, and IT departments current. And many, many more factors.

Now for the good news. The families and businesses within the Wapsie Valley district should be very proud of the way that this community has supported the foundation in the past twenty years.

Funds donated through the foundation support basic learning opportunities for every student in the WV district.

Keep Wapsie Valley Education Foundation in mind if you like the idea of your donations staying “local.” New this year, Mrs. Gross and her FCS students are providing a free-will offering babysitting service to make it easier and worry-free for parents with young children to attend this year’s dinner and auction. It is mid-November in Northeast Iowa.

The lush green grass in yards has turned dull, shaded in places with light patches, where weedy perennials during the summer months flourished. Only clumps of wooded spires remain of once dense, flowering bushes and shrubs. Fallen are the gold and orange leaves on the trees, their glorious hues changed to browns, lying lifeless along concrete driveways, next to foundations, and deposited in the low spots of the earth, wherever the wind carelessly chooses to discard them.

The brisk air ~ now just days before Thanksgiving ~

tersely pronounces that days of languishing in the hot sun are gone, and warns of the big change that lies ahead.

When all must surrender to an inevitable, imminent slumber.



What's Cookin'



From the kitchen of Arnola Siggelkow

Everyone has some cookbooks they use, but now technology makes them less popular. Just punch some keys and presto you can find a recipe. I continue to like cookbooks. My first cookbook still has a place among the rest of them. It is a 1953 (1st printing) Betty Crocker Cookbook. Another one that I continue to use is the 1955 Betty Crocker Cookie Book. It has many mouthwatering recipes including old standbys such as chocolate chip, snickerdoodles, and molasses cookies.

The molasses cookies are among my favorite and are a favorite among many that have eaten them.

MOLASSES CRINKLES

- ¾ c. soft shortening
- 1 c. brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg
- ¼ c. molasses
(I use Grandma's molasses)
- 2¼ c. flour
- 2 tps. baking soda
- ¼ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. ground cloves
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ground ginger



Thoroughly mix shortening, sugar, and egg, add molasses and mix. Blend dry ingredients and gradually blend in other ingredients. Cover and refrigerate at least two hours or overnight. Shape dough into 1¼ inch balls (or use a cookie scoop). Dip tops in granulated sugar. Place balls, sugar side up, about 3 inches apart on a greased cookie sheet. Sprinkle the top of each ball with 2 or 3 drops of water. Bake at 375 degrees for about 10 minutes (just until set – do not overbake). Remove from cookie sheet and cool on wire rack. Makes 4 dozen cookies.

You are probably thinking about your menu for Thanksgiving Dinner. I suggest you make Cornbread Casserole as one of your vegetable side dishes. Its ingredients include whole kernel corn, creamed corn, and Jiffy cornbread mix. Try it - you will like it.

CORNBREAD CASSEROLE

- 1 can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 can creamed corn
- 2 eggs, beaten
- ½ c. butter, melted & cooled
- 1 c. sour cream
- 1 box Jiffy cornbread mix



Mix corn, sour cream, beaten eggs, butter, and salt. Add cornbread mix and blend well. Pour into greased 8"x8" or 9"x9" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes or until lightly brown and center is set. The exact baking time will depend on the pan size, so watch the casserole closely.

Optional: You can sprinkle the casserole top with grated cheddar cheese when almost baked and return to the oven for 5 minutes. Chopped scallions or parsley make a nice garnish.



REGULAR MEETING

The Fairbank City Council met in regular session on Monday, September 26, 2022. Mayor Cowell called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM with the Pledge of Allegiance. Members present: R. Woods, Williams, Erickson, and Coffin. Absent: T. Woods. Also, present at City Hall: Heather Prendergast, Attorney; Dakota Drish, Police Chief; Brian Delagardelle, Water/Wastewater Operator; Nick Kuker, Public Works; and Brittany Fuller, City Clerk. Williams/Erickson to approve the agenda. Ayes: Four. Nays: None. There were no public comments during the public comment section. Williams/Erickson to approve the minutes of the September 12th Regular Meeting. Ayes: Four. Nays: None. The federal grant that was awarded to the city for the sidewalk along Fourth Street needed some documents approved to receive the federal funds for the project. Erickson/Coffin to approve the federal grant funds title VI documents for funding for the TAP Grant award called Walk Safe Fairbank. Ayes: Four. Nays: None. Discussions on the letter regarding drafted to the DNR regarding the city's burn pile took place. The compost section of the yard waste area is good to keep if it is maintained the way it has been. Williams/Coffin to draft a letter to DNR stating that there will be no more burning at this site as of November 1, 2022, and that the gate to the area will be closed as of October 15, 2022, to allow for adequate time to clean what has been dropped off before November 1, 2022. There will be a key that can be checked out from City Hall between the hours of 9 AM and 5 PM, Monday through Friday for compost materials only. Meaning no tree waste will be allowed at that time. The council will evaluate the yard waste area and will be prepared to make some changes by spring of 2023 but for now nothing can be dropped off at the waste area unless it is compost. Ayes: Four. 


