The Fairbank Islander is a FREE full-color newspaper that will be published the first Wednesday of each month and mailed to everyone with a Fairbank or Oran zipcode (currently 996 households). We will also have 500 additional copies printed to distribute in some local businesses and surrounding communities. Subscriptions will be available to people living out of the area.

Looking back, it really wasn't the best time to start a newspaper because of the Covid-19 situation. There's not a lot of news to print when schools, businesses, churches, and organizations are all shut down and nothing is going on. But bear with us, it will get better. We just hope that everyone is staying safe.

We are very excited about this new project. But it

wouldn't be possible without the support of our local businesses that have purchased advertising. We're very grateful for your help. The revenue from the advertising will be used to cover the expense of the printing and mailing, which is done by the Oelwein Daily Register. Because of the quarantine and closings, we know that there are some businesses that we haven't contacted, but we hope you will consider purchasing an ad. It's not too late. Fairbank Historical Society perpetuates history

The Fairbank Historical Society is a public charity, non-profit educational organization, formally organized February 10, 2009. It is dedicated to perpetuating the history of the Fairbank area. The Society received its non-profit tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3) from the Internal Revenue Service on August 7, 2009.

The Society is governed by a 5 member Board of Directors, each serving three year terms. The 2020 Board of Directors are: Joe Miller, Colleen Bovy, Wilma Welsh, Maurice Welsh, and Robert Shields. It holds it's annual meeting in January of each year. Monthly meetings are on the 4th Tuesday of each month at 1:30 p.m., and are held at the Historical Society Museum building located at 103 East Main Street. Operation is maintained by revenue received from memberships, donations, and fundraising. The 2020 Officers are: Bob Shields - President; Joe Miller - Vice President; Wilma Welsh - Secretary; and Maurice Welsh - Treasurer.

The Fairbank Historical Society first organized in 2009 when a group of interested citizens met in the Fairbank Library to discuss local history. They formed an Historical Society and elected officers. The Society met in the Fairbank Library for over a year, then moved the meetings to the Parkside Assisted Living Center to better serve the members that were residents.

On January 1, 2013, Robert Maricle donated the building at 103 East Main Street to the society to use as a Museum. The building had previously housed Maricle's family business "Maricle on Main." After remodeling the front half of the building, the Fairbank Historical Society Museum opened on Memorial Day weekend. Recently the Society received a large donation from the Estate of Howard Durham.

The Museum houses Fairbank High School graduation pictures, items salvaged from the Elementary School before it was torn down, many small advertising items from Fairbank businesses from the past, local genealogical information, art work by local artists, and many other items.

The Museum normally is open on Memorial Day weekend thru Labor Day, on Sunday afternoons from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. They can open anytime by calling 319-269-6795 for private tours or for information. The status of opening this year depends on the Covid-19 virus.



God's peace to you in Christ!

My name is Rev. Jacob Swenson. I am privileged to serve as pastor at St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church here in Fairbank and Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jesup. St. John's and Grace are member congregations of a church body called the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. The LCMS has about 2 million members in roughly 6 thousand congregations throughout our country. It has about 37 partner church bodies around the world. There are 294 LCMS congregations in Iowa.

I was approached to write what (hopefully) might be a regular column in this new paper of ours. I am honored and happy to visit with you. I'm hoping that with our time together we might have a monthly conversation about the Christian faith. We'll talk about Jesus, of course, but also about the forgiveness of sins, the Bible, the Church, and other things related to our common faith. In time, we might even talk about Lutheranism, since some of you might have questions about what it is, in particular. My goal with these conversations is not just to inform, but also to encourage and strengthen our community as we walk together in Christ.

Now, I am a Lutheran pastor. That means you should expect that I think and write like one, for better or worse. If you find that our conservations spark questions - good! That's what I like to hear. I do not promise that I'll have all the answers, since I'm just a pilgrim on this earth like you; but I'd love to help you as best as I can. St. John's is the big white church just south of the cemetery. You'll find me there.

Let's let this be our first theological conversation (theology is a word that means "study of God"): Who is Jesus? What do Christians believe? Christians believe that Jesus is the one, only, true, and eternal God. You might also hear Christians say that Jesus is the Son of God. This is a short way to say that Jesus is the Second Person of the Trinity, who - with the Father and the Holy Spirit - is yet one God. (More on that later.) Christians believe that, in addition to being truly and fully God, Jesus is also man. We say in the Apostles' Creed that Jesus was, "conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary." Jesus did not change from one into the other, but became - and is now - both God and man. He did this so that He might save us from death by His own death and resurrection.

This is probably enough for our first conversation. We'll pick up here next month. If you have questions about anything I've said, I'd love to visit with you. You know where to find me: big white church, next to the cemetery.

Rhubarb is an early, plentiful spring fruit used in desserts, jams and wines. The stalks have a rich tart flavor, but the leaves are poisonous. Although, you can eat the stalks raw, you probably won't enjoy the sour, bitter taste, but there are many delicious ways to use it with sugar or by combining with strawberries or red raspberries. One of my favorite rhubarb recipes is this quick easy-to-make dessert.

Rhubarb Upside Down Cake

5 cups finely diced rhubarb

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 oz. package strawberry jello
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows



1 yellow cake mix (prepared according to package directions)

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9" x 13" pan. Put the marshmallows on the bottom of the pan. Place the rhubarb on top of the marshmallows in an even layer. Mix together the jello and sugar and pour over the rhubarb layer. Prepare the cake mix according to package directions. Pour the cake batter over the rhubarb mixture. Bake 50-60 minutes until cake tests done. Remove the pan from oven and let it set for 5 minutes. Loosen the edges of the cake from the pan. Place a tray on top of the pan and flip upside down.

It is delicious served with whipped topping!



WAPSIE VALLEY WINS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

By the time this newspaper comes out, this would probably be considered old news. But, in honor of all the fans out there in Wapsie Nation, we will run it anyway.

The Warriors and their families returned to big celebrations in Readlyn and Fairbank, complete with parades and lots of excitement which carried on till late that night.

Wow, what a ride!! Our Cinderella Team had pulled off what seemed to be an impossible dream.

We are so proud of our Warriors and their coaches. Thank you for giving us our own "March Madness" and for representing your school and communities with such style and class. It was a season we won't forget!

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A Community of Townsfolk and Farmers; Hobos, Amish and Gangsters

I am pleased to get the opportunity to write a column for the Fairbank Islander, though I'm not sure exactly what I'll write here. I'm hoping you'll give me some ideas (I love requests).

For those of you who may not know, my primary family of Brandts (10) moved from a farm south of town into Fairbank in the mid-1950s. My parents were Wilbert J. and Doretta (Bartels) Brandt. Dad served as councilman, then Fairbank's mayor for two terms from 1980-1983. Dur-

ing an interview by staff from the Oelwein Register in 1980, when the library was built, he made this statement: "We came to Fairbank and really liked the town. We decided to move here."

That's when I learned the story of how our family ended up in Fairbank, the town with the iconic Island Park.

Some of you may also remember I wrote a column for the Wapsie Progressive during the 1970s-'80s. I didn't get serious about writing books until retiring from 3M Company in St. Paul, Minn. a decade ago. Two of the three books I've now written have been about Fairbank, all of which are available at the Fairbank Community Library (check for curbside checkout/pickup times during the coronavirus).

Book #1: We Are Eight, a Memoriam (2015) is a 400page book which begins in the mid-1800s, when our first German ancestors immigrated to America. The second half of the book is dedicated to the years my siblings and I were growing up in Fairbank, concluding in the 1980s, as one by one we graduated Wapsie Valley High School.

Book #2: *Gangster in Our Midst* (2017) is my first historical novel which tells the neglected true story about the Italian American man, Louie La Cava, who came to Fairbank (called 'Oxbow' in the book) in the 1920s—where he lived off and on for the next sixty years.

I first heard the town had a gangster around 9 years of age, soon after we arrived in town. I had no idea what a gangster was, so I paid little attention to the story at the time.



Fast forward to 2016 when I was looking for a new book project. On my short list of book ideas was: "Investigate Fairbank's gangster."

My research began by speaking with octogenarians I had interviewed for Book #1. I asked them to tell me what they knew about the town's gangster. Long story short: Ninety years later, no one still seemed to know with any certainty whether La Cava had been part of Chicago kingpin Alphonse Capone's outfit--or if the stories were simply folklore.

I continued to dig--and what a story I found.

A common question I get from those who've read *Gangster in Our Midst* is: What is factual versus fiction?

Factual: The Capone-La Cava connections came from the Bureau of Investigation (which became the Federal Bureau of Investigation) and police reports, plus from newspaper accounts from across the nation.

Fictional: The personal stories came from Fairbank locals, about what it was like to live with a gangster frequenting their town. Most of the events really happened, though perhaps not exactly as I've told them.

Those from the area will recognize names, businesses, and landmarks in the historical novel. And there is plenty of intrigue. A lot of people got caught up in Prohibition in one way or another. Most didn't know what La Cava actually did for Capone but read enough in newspaper articles about the ongoing gangsterism in Chicago and New York to be wary of any new guy who showed up on Main Street driving a fast, black car, smoking a Cuban cigar, and dressing in tailor-made suit and fedora. Many residents came to fear La Cava...and feared he might be followed by thugs and their children would get caught up in a shoot-out on Main Street.

Gangster in Our Midst received a 2019 Notable 100 Indie Book Award from Shelf Unbound book review magazine. I'm grateful to the five Fairbank historians (acknowledged in the book) who helped with research, along with myriad friends and former neighbors—all who informed me I had written a good story. A book award says the book has literary merit. Mostly, I'm grateful this Unknown Author has been given a chance to earn positive regard in the eyes of the community at large.

Book #4--a sequel to *Gangster in our Midst*—is in process and will be available the summer of 2020. I chose this week's column title from the chapter: "Morning Train" (Book #2).

The character of 'Olivia' is loosely based on Verlie Hahn's mother, Olivia Coffin, who works at the Coffin Café. Lunch patrons frequently include businessmen and farmers--plus a few more arriving on the 11:00 dinky. On this May 1936 morning, Olivia first notices the train has delivered the usual influx of hobos, who immediately set about going from house to house in search of a handout. She's caught off guard by the large colony of Amish men who soon flood the café (their womenfolk and children remain at the depot to eat packed lunches). Two smartly dressed men take the remaining table and begin to probe for information on the whereabouts of the town's gangster.



PET LICENSING

<u>REMINDER</u> – All city residents with pets over the age of four months are required to be licensed by the city. This license is to be renewed annually. The cost is \$10.00 per animal if purchased on or before June 30th of each year. On July 1st an additional \$5.00 penalty attaches. If the animal is purchased July 1st or later, the license can be obtained for \$10.00 with a dated bill of sale proving the date of purchase.

Also, to be licensed, you must show proof that the animal has been vaccinated against rabies. It is prohibited to have animals running at large within the city limits.

An Update From ... FAIRBANK POLICE DEPARTMENT

Now that warmer weather is upon us, the Police Department wants residents to be aware of a few City code violations.

It is unlawful for any person to store, accumulate, or allow "junk" to remain on any private property within the limits of the city. "Junk" refers to old scrap, copper, brass, lead, trash, debris, appliances and so forth. This also goes along with "junk" vehicles. All vehicles that are visible to the public that are parked on private property must be up to date on registration, in a running and driving condition and driven at least one time every 30 days

The Police Department also wants residents to be aware of the curfew times for any person under the age of 18. From Sunday thru Thursday, the curfew for anyone under 18 is 11:00 p.m. On Friday and Saturdays, the curfew is moved back to 12:00 midnight.

Also, a reminder to anyone that operates an ATV/UTV/Golf Cart: the hours of driving such vehicles within city limits are between sunrise and sunset. There are no specific times established.
