A softball diamond was added.

The association dissolved and the town acquired the land. Over the years, more land was purchased

adjacent to the ball park to the west from Gene Wilson.

A picnic shelter was built and an impressive array of playground equipment was added by the Fun for Everyone Campaign. The complex now includes two ball diamonds and three volleyball courts.

A walking path was built from the corner of Fairbank St. to the complex, so that children can enjoy a safer access to the ball park.

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


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The Contest ~ Harvest 2020

On Thursday, February 25, 2021 at the Readlyn Event Center, the awards banquet was held for the 30th Annual Readlyn Savings Bank & American Savings Bank Bremer County Master Corn & Soybean Growers' Yield Contest: a.k.a. "The Contest." Years ago, there were a number of such county yield contests but today "The Contest" is the only one of its kind in Bremer County – and perhaps the entire state of Iowa.

Sponsored by the two local, rural Bremer County Banks in Readlyn and Tripoli, The Contest is a friendly competition between area farmers. The Contest Banquet provides Bremer County area farmers an evening of camaraderie and celebration of the previous year's harvest: Harvest 2020. The Banquet is held annually before spring at Center Inn with Sunrise Catering

providing great appetizers, a superb prime rib buffet and dessert.

Following dinner, the bank heard from Jeff Brunscheon, general manager at Farmers Co-op in Readlyn. Brunscheon visited with the 70 banquet attendees and answered questions concerning the grain markets. Brunscheon emphasized diligence when making grain marketing decisions this year. This was Brunscheon's fourteenth straight year speaking at The Banquet.

Following dinner Doug Sheppard, Vice President of Readlyn Savings Bank, presented the first award of the night: The 11th Annual Vernon L. Tonne Spirit of the Contest. The Award annually honors the long-time enthusiastic and good-natured participation of a Master Grower who exemplifies The Spirit of the Contest..

The Award for Harvest 2020 was given to Brian Meyer of Readlyn, IA. Along with attending the contest for many years as a contestant, Brian was recognized for his enthusiasm for the contest and his passion for farming.

The Contest publishes results that include variables such as seed company brand and hybrid number, traits, dates of planting and harvesting, row spacing, population, as well as applications of fertilizers, herbicides, and fungicides.

2020 Harvest included a contest record number of entries with a total of 36 yield checks conducted in the 4 Contest Divisions: 18 conventional corn, 7 no-till corn, 5 conventional beans and 6 no-till beans.



It wasn't unusual to bump into Bob Dietz on the street of Fairbank. One summer morning in 2004 I did just that. Robert lived and farmed outside of Wadena, but still did business in Fairbank. At his advanced age he would have to "catch a ride" to town. After the usual greetings and a joke, Bob conveyed his "big idea". Bob told me, "back when he was a young man, Fairbank was the place to be", and "Fairbank's history needed to be saved". He related how at one time Fairbank had five grocery stores, three hardware stores, two drug stores, two banks, two blacksmith shops, two barber shops, the Wilstie Hotel, and three doctors: Doctor Ward, Doctor Bothwell and Doctor Murphy. I agreed with him that Fairbank had a story to tell, but never did anything about it at the time.

Bob was a prolific writer of "Letters to

the Editor" mostly on politics, sometimes on Fairbank, and more than once on his lifelong career in agriculture. He had a strong dislike for "Daylight Saving Time".


One of his favorite stories he liked to tell about Fairbank went like this: The morning had started out cold and began to rain heavily before lunch. Fairbank's Doctor Murphy received a call. A farmer south of town was expecting a new baby and needed a doctor. After finishing a large lunch, he put on a heavy coat, a raincoat on top of that, his 5 buckle overshoes, and a heavy pair of mittens. Doctor Murphy mounted his buggy for the 5-mile drive though the rain storm to the

It was late in the evening when Doctor Murphy arrived at the farm. He immediately went to check with the mother while his horse was taken care of. After midnight, a healthy baby boy was born. Doctor Murphy had made plans to stay the night because the roads were almost impassable on his drive out to the farm, but he ended up staying at the farm for 4 days because it had started to snow heavily and everything had come to a standstill. This Easter weekend storm ended up being one of the worst in memory, with rain, sleet, and snow.

Bob proudly states "I was that boy that arrived on that farm March 22, 1913. It was Easter Sunday, and on my next birthday I will be 96 years old". Robert was able to celebrate eight more birthdays before his passing on December 4, 2017, at the age of 104.

Bob had told me his origin story a number of times before and I'm sure he had told the story to others numerous times. Bolstered with Bob's zeal for Fairbank history, I started the Fairbank Historical Society in 2009. I planned the first meeting around one of Bob's trips to Fairbank so he could be at that first meeting at the Fairbank Library.

He always had interesting life stories to tell. One of my favorites: Leading up



to the end of prohibition, Bob and some other boys had gotten a job cleaning a bar in Waterloo so it would be able to open the day after prohibition ended in 1933. After midnight on opening day, the owner sent Bob and another boy to "tap" the first keg of beer. Being a 20-year-old young man who had no fear of failure, and also had no idea how to tap a keg of beer, still enthusiastically procured the needed tools. With one hammer blow he broke the seal and not having hit the tap hard enough to drive it home, beer shot out the seal to the ceiling of the bar.

As stated, Robert Harry Dietz was born March 22, 1913, on the family farm south of Fairbank. He married Elizabeth Susanna Taylor at the Little Brown Church in Nashua on May 15, 1939. One of his pleasures was telling people that he married Elizabeth Taylor to see their reaction, then a smile would cross his face. Bob and Elizabeth had 3 children: Guy, Robert, and Max. Elizabeth passed away September 25, 2002. Both Robert and Elizabeth are buried in the Lima Cem-

Robert served with the United States Army Corp of Engineers in the Aleutian Islands during World War II. He started farming in 1946 in the Fairbank area and, in 1959 the family moved to Wadena,

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








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Going, Going . . . Gone

The Immaculate Conception Church in Fairbank was was built in 1868, when Father Eugene O'Sullivan directed the building of the present 44'x90' stone church. It is the only church built of native stone in the area.

In 1915, Archbishop James J. Keane authorized the Parish to build a new rectory, which is the building in the pictures. Father John Q. Halpin became Pastor in July 1915 (and remained until 1931.) Father Halpin directed the completion of the construction of the rectory and made plans to move the current Sisters to the old rectory.

A 2-car garage was built next to the rectory in 1963, and in 1988 the second floor of the rectory was remodeled. In 2000 more remodeling was done in the rectory which consisted of knocking out the wall between the living room and bedroom to make one large room. The rectory roof and porch roof were shingled in 2001 and new sidewalks were poured.

In February 2020, proxy was formed for demolition and approved. A notice was put out to take bids for removal of items inside the rectory, and asbestos testing was done. A bid was accepted from Jonathan Jascher Construction for removal of doors, woodwork, etc., and Rick VanDaele agreed to help with removal of debris.

A couple of weeks ago, the rectory building and garage was brought down with a controlled burn done by the Fairbank Fire Department. Slowly, the top level of the building began to cave in. After a while, the corners of the building and the chimney were the only thing standing on that level. The firemen then worked at getting the roof of the front porch to come down. As seen in the bottom photo, the main level of the rectory slowly disappeared, leaving the bell tower of the the church in plain view.

Cleanup began the next day, with removal of remaining foundation and sidewalks. Black dirt was brought in to fill the opening and level out the ground.

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


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Save a life, donate blood Don't forget that there will be a Life Serve

where he farmed until his health forced him to move to Maple Crest Manor in Fayette. Besides grain farming on his 200-acre farm, Bob milked registered Holstein cattle, and raised registered quarter horses, hogs, and purebred border collies. Bob was also employed for over 25 years as an artificial inseminator for the American Breeders Services of Madison, Wisconsin. The Dietz called their farm the "Owl Hoot Ranch". In 2009 Bob was chosen as the Grand Marshal for the Wadena-Illyria Day parade.

Robert's grandfather, Lewis Jacob Dietz, was born August 14, 1848, in Newark, New Jersey, the son of Joseph and Caroline (Nonmacher) Dietz, both immigrants from Germany. Lewis enlisted in the Regular Army, on September 20, 1865 in Findlay, Ohio after he turned 17 and was mustered out on September 20, 1868.

Lewis married Mary Jane Leckliter in January of 1870 in Findlay, Ohio. The couple had 7 children: James Turley who married Gertrude Bothwell, they had 4 children; Charles Lewis married Anna Howe in Tulsa, Oklahoma; Joseph Leroy was a liveryman, he died in Sumner, Iowa at the age of 33; Kathryn married Frank R. Kerr. She died in Sumner Iowa; Frank Elvin married Alta Lenona Clubine, in Independence. Frank died in Cass County, Illinois and is buried at Staples, Minnesota; Lola D. married Ora Earl Coonrad. She later married Earl Conner of Floyd, Iowa;

and Harry Earl Dietz, Roberts's father.

The Lewis Dietz's family lived in Ohio and Kansas for a time before coming to Iowa in roughly 1884. The 1885 census for Fayette County has the family living in Jefferson Township. By 1890 they had moved to the southwest corner of Fairbank Township near Littleton. Lewis was a farmer and blacksmith. Lewis ran the Dietz Blacksmith Shop in Fairbank and later partnered with Louis Miller for a time in the Miller and Dietz Blacksmith Shop.


Mary Jane died February 27, 1916. Lewis later married Sarah (McCray) Potts, John Potts's widow, April 8, 1918. After Sarah's death on December 28, 1921, Lewis married Alice (Durham) Brant, Philander Allen Brant's widow, on January 4, 1923. John Potts and Philander Allen Brant were also veterans of the War of the Rebellion. Lewis died November 11, 1925. All are buried in the Fairbank Cemetery.

Robert's father, Harry Earl Dietz was born September 9, 1890 in Fairbank Township. Harry married Abbedell Ruth Metson on April 27, 1910, in Independence. Harry was a laborer for the railroad. Abbie and Harry had four sons, Roy of Waterloo; Robert from Wadena; Dale Irving, living at Decorah; Hugh J. in Richmond California; and three daughters; Margaret Mary, Margaret married Oliver Patrick Regenold, they lived in Fairbank; Betty, married Clell Wagner and lived in Salem, Oregon; Iva Jean married Donald Harness, they lived in Excelsior Springs, Missouri.

"Raising a Family on the Wapsie Circle S Ranch"

Arnola Siggelkow was born in a farmhouse near West Union on March 10, 1932 to Arnold and Lydia (Hochberger) Wendland. She was their third child, joining two sisters, Betty Ruth, 4, and Doris Ellen, 2.

"My parents were hoping for a boy to be named Arnold Jr. Being a girl, they named me Arnola Jean, a name that leads to many comments, even nicknames such as Nola, Shinola, and Arnie," she said.

Six years later, they had a boy they named Ronald.

Arnola has a vivid memory from early childhood from about four years old when their house burned to the ground. An overheated stovepipe on a wood-burning stove caused the fire. The family then moved to a farm between Hawkeye and West Union.

She attended country school for eight years, walking 1.5 miles twice a day between home and school. Sometimes, when no crops were growing, she would cut diagonally through fields and a little timber, reducing the commute to 3/4 of a mile each way.

Attending high school at West Union, she rode the school bus all four years. Band and speech were her extra activities. Arnola graduated in 1949 as valedictorian of her class of 59 students and started classes at Upper Iowa University that summer and continued the next year and summer. She was awarded a two-year teaching certificate, and later received a B.A. with an emphasis in Elementary Art.

Arnola said she was inspired by a grade-school teacher who was always kind and friendly, and remembered Arnola years later.

Her career started in August 1950 at Stanley Community School teaching third grade and high school girls' Physical Education (men were not allowed to teach girls' PE). The Superintendent watched over her classroom while she taught girls' P.E. She also coached junior high girls' basketball, high school speech, and directed plays. All of this was done for a yearly salary of \$2,100.

Her teaching experience at Stanley was successful and rewarding. She taught at West Union and Decorah before her marriage. She and Wayne were married June 26, 1955 at Trinity Lutheran Church at Hawkeye. They came to Fairbank at her present location to start the 'Wapsie Circle S' ranch, where she's been ever since. (Wayne passed away August 24, 2013.)

Arnola continued teaching at Dunkerton and Fairbank before becoming a mother and a 'farm hand' - then continued as a substitute teacher until 1986 when she returned to teaching fulltime, starting the Elementary Art program at Dunkerton. Next, she went to Denver to start their Elementary Art program, teaching until her retirement. Her love of teaching enticed her to continue as a substitute teacher for many more years.

Wayne was very creative in building their home in 1955. An addition in 1977 included 20 feet oak beams cut from their timber. Its foundation and fireplace wall were made up of stone quarried at Stone City (Grant Wood Country).

"I must say the natural elements blend well with the bear, deer, moose, and caribou who call this land home," Arnola said - adding, "the Great Room, with its wall of glass, provides a beautiful view of the outdoors, magnificent sunsets, and full moons reflecting on the water. Pheasants, turkeys, ducks, geese, eagles, deer, and other wildlife come to visit. At times, a fish will flip in the pond. What a joy to hear frogs croaking their songs and to see the array of colorful birds coming to feed."

She and Wayne were blessed with three daughters: Carol Jean, Jane Ann, and Mary Beth. The girls enjoyed helping on the farm - be it feeding chickens, chasing cattle, pulling weeds, or whatever. They were also very active in school activities and 4-H on the local county and state levels. After each of them graduated Dunkerton

High School, then Iowa State University, they graduated Harvard University, University of Michigan Law School, and University of Iowa Law School, respectively.

In 1965 Wayne and Arnola added a new breed of cattle to the ranch. "The fold of Scottish Highland cattle added much to farm activities," she noted. "The Highland cows and bulls had impressive horns and long hair. The heifer calves were branded with the Circle S brand and put in the herd; bull calves were fattened for market. The meat from the Scottish Highland was of prime quality and always in demand."

The family enjoyed a trip to Scotland to see the ancestral homeland of their Highland cattle. We saw some grazing on the grounds around Queen Elizabeth's summer palace. The story is that Scottish Highland beef is the only beef served at Buckingham Palace.

Cattle needing to be fed and haymaking were big jobs in the summer, often resulting in three cuttings of hay. Arnola mowed and raked the hay and ran the baler. The girls and their cousins had help from several strong neighbor boys. The 'lucky ones' got to load the bales, 64 bales to a wagon. Of course, the weather was usually hot, the fields bumpy--and Arnola drove too fast. You can imagine the reaction when a snake would wiggle out of a bale while they were stacking the bales on the wagon. The girls helped drive the tractor to pull up the hay fork full of eight bales at a time after Wayne had the fork set. One year, they put 10,000 bales of hay in the barn.

The girls always looked forward to the yearly drive to Missouri or Minnesota to buy fireworks for the annual Fourth of July celebration with family and friends.

July was always 'Fair Time,' and the girls' 4-H activities kept them busy preparing fair exhibits to display at the county and state fairs.

As soon as the fair activities were over, the family took their annual family vacation. These trips took them to many states, national parks, and historic sites. Sometimes they went fishing in Canada.

Arnola and Wayne also enjoyed traveling in their retirement years, visiting all fifty states and many countries. Arnola has many fond (and not so fond) memories of traveling... Her first speeding ticket was in 1977 in New York state. She adds she was ship-wrecked two times: once on the Atlantic Ocean off the shores of Cape Cod, and once on Lac Seul, Canada. She has been privileged to view many spectacular vistas, from the crown of the Statute of Liberty, the Washington Monument, the St. Louis Arch, the Seattle Space Needle, and the Eiffel Tower, to name a few.

"Among my many souvenirs are some small chunks from the Berlin Wall," from a visit to Germany in 1990 (the wall between East Berlin and West Berlin fell in 1989). Arnola noted: "Yes, I climbed the wall, chipped away to get some chunks, and dared bring them home in my luggage on the plane–without any questions asked."

She also treasures her certificate as a bartender which she earned at the Guinness Brewery in Dublin.

The family received the Century Farm Award, and in 2017 was presented with the Heritage Farm Award given for a parcel of the farm being in the Siggelkow family for over 150 years. The ranch includes cropland, prairie, timber, and the Wapsipinicon River runs through it--the reason the family on occasion has been called 'Wapsie River Rats' for having land along both the Big Wapsie and the Little Wapsie.

Besides raising their children, teaching, and farming, Arnola found time to do other things of personal interest. She served as a docent at the Waterloo Center for the Arts. She has taught classes through Hawkeye Community College, Sunday School, Bible School, and served on





the Church Council. She is a member of the Fairbank Historical Society, Fairbank American Legion Auxiliary, and the Fairbank Community Club.

An important part of her life has been 4-H, having been a 4-H member, a 4-H mother, a 4-H leader, and a 4-H judge at county and state fairs. Arnola served on the Black Hawk County Extension Council, the Black Hawk County 4-H and FFA Foundation, and Black Hawk County Conservation Board for ten years. In 2010 she was inducted into the Iowa 4-H Hall of Fame.

Having been an antiques collector and former antique dealer, Arnola has enjoyed giving programs about her collections and interests. Sewing, too, became an interest (sometimes out of necessity). She even made her wedding dress, then Carol's and Jane's wedding gowns, as well as many prom and special occasion dresses.

She enjoys decorating cakes and doing many crafts. Her love of baking is renowned. Years ago, she began the practice of making home-made cookies or bars and sharing them with others. "A little bag of cookies is always a welcome treat," Arnola said. Her recipes are published in the Fairbank Islander.

Arnola added: "I am blessed to have three daughters and three sonsin-law. I have eleven grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Wayne and I had 58 wonderful years together filled with many surprises. With love, determination, and hard work, we overcame fire, floods, and tornadoes to establish the family farm."

Now in her 'elderly years,' Arnola still shares and practices her motto-'Always do the best you can with what you have wherever you are, and you will go far.'

"Yes, I have gone far, and now it is time for me to thank my Lord, play cards, read, spend time with family and friends and continue to enjoy life," Arnola said.

Me: Hiking is getting tired unnecessarily, but I want to look the part.

He: Could you pick up a couple of things for me? Me: Like sexy smelling after-shave and silk sheets?

He: Just bug spray and kerosene for the stove.

Grace to you and peace from God the Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ!

It's been a little bit since we got off course. Some time back we had begun a journey, discussing together some of the basic points of Christian doctrine. My hope is that through these articles you might be encouraged in your Christian faith or, for those of you who do not believe, that you might have a clear picture of what Christians believe and why. It's been a little bit since we've veered off, so let's get back on the road. This month let's talk about the Church: What is it for?

Notice here that I'm using a capital C in "Church." By this mean I mean the whole body of Christians around the world. Why does this fellowship exist? It has to do with the verse I quoted up at the top. You might recognize that it comes from the Parable of the Prodigal Son, which is found in Luke 15. Here, Jesus told a story about a man who had two sons. The younger son came to his father and demanded that what was to be his inheritance be given to him then and there. The son took his inheritance money and went to a faraway country. There he spent it all frivolously and wastefully. He took his share of what his father had worked long and hard for and squandered it.

The parable goes that the son came to his senses while he was sitting in a pigpen. He realized that, while he was there (now) starving, his father's servants had well beyond what they needed. He figured he would go back to his father, confess that he was no longer worthy to be counted as a son, and instead be brought on as a hired hand. The father saw him from a long way off and did what a successful businessman didn't. He felt compassion for his son. He hiked up his robes (the attire of the day) and ran to his son. He hugged and kissed him; he ordered a feast to be held, since his son who was "dead" was now "alive." To put it in a simple term, the father forgave his son. He could have held a grudge, refusing to have anything to do with this "son" of his; perhaps, he even could have pursued some sort of legal remedy. He didn't. He forgave.

Forgiveness is the act of choosing to not hold a mistake or misdeed against someone. It goes deeper than that, though, because the father in the parable represents how God acts toward us. The younger son represents you and me. We have taken what the Father has given us and misused it in all sorts of terrible ways. And, sometimes we don't even care. The Lord would have every right to hold our actions against us but, instead, He forgives. The Church is where the forgiveness of sins is received. It's where we get to hear again and again about how Jesus took our sins into Himself and died for them so that we might be at peace. Yes, the Church has other stuff going on, too; but this is the main thing and why we (St. John's, included) exist - to hear of and receive continually the free forgiveness of our sins and the comfort and hope that go with it. I invite you to join us.

Here is one of Angela Berg's favorite recipes. She said, "The Jalapeno Poppers with Bacon make a great side dish for a Keto friendly diet." Once you make them, I am sure you will be making them again!



Jalapeno Poppers with Bacon

(Makes 12 poppers)
6 med. jalapeno peppers (sliced lengthwise & seeded) 1/4 cup cheddar cheese (shredded)

3 oz. cream cheese (softened) Minced garlic

1/4 cup bacon bits (pre-cooked)

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a small bowl, stir together the cream cheese, shredded cheddar cheese, and garlic. (You can heat a bit if the cream cheese is too hard.) Fill the jalapeno pepper halves with the cream cheese mixture. Place onto the lined baking sheet. Top each jalapeno pepper with about a teaspoon of bacon bits, pressing lightly into the cream cheese filling. Bake about 15 minutes. Enjoy!

July is ice cream month. Why not chill out with one of my favorites?

Oreo Mint Chip Ice Cream Dessert

- 1 15.5 oz. pkg. of Oreo Cookies (not with double filling)
- 1/4 cup butter (melted)
- 1 1.75 quart mint chip ice cream
- 1 small jar of chocolate fudge ice cream topping
- 1 8 oz. whipped topping

Crush the Oreo into fine crumbs. Reserve 3/4 cup. Mix crumbs with melted butter and put in the bottom of a greased 9"x13" pan. Pat firmly. Slice ice cream and put on top of crumbs. Drizzle topping over ice cream (if topping is too stiff, put jar in hot water for a few minutes.) Cover and freeze 2-3 hours. Spread whipped topping evenly over top, then sprinkle with reserved cookie crumbs. Freeze until just before serving. Enjoy!

October 7, 1925 ~ July 71, 2021


