

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# Independence Receives \$350,000 CDBG Grant

INDEPENDENCE - Buchanan County Economic Development (BCEDC), Independence Area Chamber of Commerce, the City of Independence along with Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments (INRCOG) and the Independence downtown building owners are pleased to announce that Independence has been chosen for the CDBG-CV façade grant. This façade program will include an additional 7 building facades. This is in addition to the regular CDBG façade grant just received for \$500,000 and eight facades. In total Independence will see 15 facades undergo renovation and revitalization through this program.

As part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Securities (CARES) Act in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, additional CDBG funds were given to the State of Iowa to help communities respond to the pandemic. The City of Independence applied to the CD-BG-CV program and received an additional \$350,000 to assist seven building facades. The buildings to undergo facade restoration under this program include Joe's Pizza (2 facades), Elm Tree Concepts (2 facades), and B & D Services (3 facades)

Eric and Lisa Mahr, owners of Elm Tree Concepts explained, "We are so excited to be a part of the downtown Independence revitalization project and to be awarded this grant. This will allow us to get started on some much-needed im-

provements to our building. We plan to update the front of our store with a new look to make it more inviting and incorporate some energy efficient options as well. It's an exciting time to be a part of the Independence community and we are grateful to be a part of it."

'This is an incredible opportunity for Independence! Buchanan County Economic Development (BCEDC) is excited to see this kind of commitment and investment by the state in Buchanan County," commented Lisa Kremer, BCEDC Executive Director. "This opportunity will only build momentum for the Independence downtown and Buchanan County!"

With that in mind, I went back to some of my favorite stores and bought a variety of gift cards. I've yet to decide who will get the used toaster and some chipped cups and saucers.



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
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# "Christmas – 1931"

The churches advertised their Christmas Eve service in local newspapers and on marquees out front, when angelic children would recite Scripture and sing the age-old songs announcing the birth of the Christ Child and entrance of the Savior into the world. And each congregation diligently equipped for over-flow crowds, anticipating every seat in the house would be filled.

Two days before Christmas a soundless, steady wet snowfall began that dropped a thick, white coating onto frozen roads, barren trees, and steeped rooftops, turning the landscape into a brumous wonderland. Then, on Christmas Eve day, the temperature plummeted into the low teens.

Undeterred, townsfolk made plans for the trek to church for the midnight ser-

vice by car or on foot. Several families in the countryside though, like ancestors of old, harnessed horses to a wooden sleigh or wagon, and climbed aboard, bundled in heavy coats, boots, scarves, hats and gloves, with heated bricks at their feet, and covered over by a thick horse blanket, to sing carols mile after mile to the rhythmic accompaniment of sleigh bells dangling from leather horse harnesses, the ringing intermingled with the crunch of horse hooves and wheels traversing snowpacked roads; the light from a crisp moon illumining their way, enough that sightings of Santa could be called out.

In town, the old gas lamps lit the way, as sweet-toned bells resonated from church bell towers, inviting one and all: "Come! Come! Come!"

One by one worshippers reached the front doors of the Lutheran, Methodist, and Baptist churches, where frozen faces, fingers and toes received proper attention by the membership. The Methodists had the biggest draw for any unchurched, as Dr. George Eickelberg, the town's dentist, and a big man known for his booming bass voice, sang in the choir.

The nuns at the Catholic church cared for shivering arrivals for midnight Mass, which this year included Walter Bierkoff and his sons. Shoulder to shoulder sat the parishioners, an ocean of Roman Catholics huddled in candlelit pews in the frosty cathedral-like nave.

"Excuse me," Josephine La Cava whispered, standing next to Walter in the wide center aisle. "Can you fit two more into this row?"

Walter and the boys stepped out into the aisle while worshippers in the pew bumped together, enough so the La Cavas could be seated. Finally, the three sat back

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down, with Louie's shoulder smashed up against Walter's, the smell of evergreen boughs in the windows now intermingled with Louie's witch hazel.


"We're late getting to church," Walter overheard Josephine say to the woman next to her. "Lou has just recently come back to town. It is so good to have him home...one of God's miracles on an evening of miracles."

Walter finished reading the bulletin announcements, covertly folded the notation about member giving, and inserted it in an inside coat pocket.

Suddenly, everyone rose to their feet, except Walter, as the procession and entrance song began. Down the center aisle came the censer bearer, followed by the cross bearers, the readers, and deacon who carried the Book of the Gospels, slightly elevated-then the other concelebrants, and finally, the priest celebrant, the new priest, Father Torpey.

Nearing the reading of the passage from the Gospel of Luke, Leonard went forward to read from the Lectionary for Mass, where he spoke slowly, hardly stuttering at all.

Walter whispered, "Good job, son!" as Leonard returned to his seat.





"We pray for Emma Bierkoff. May God give her the strength to endure her illness, bring her once more to full health, and return her home to Walter and the boys, Leonard and Samuel."

Walter didn't know how much of what the Christian Church had preached throughout the ages was true about the Creator God, or which parts were hope disguised as truth. He still had questions. What he knew for certain was the feeling of warmth that came over him during the prayer for Emma. And he felt swaddled in the love and kindness of these people.

### Grace to you and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ!


This month is another exciting one in the Church Year, as we pass through the season of Advent and into the celebration of Christmas. Christmas, of course, is the time where we celebrate the birth of Jesus. He who was God from all eternity entered into His creation. He was born like us so that He might die for us, to save us from our sins. That is what the name Jesus means – "The Lord saves." Before we get to Christmas, though, we must pass through the Advent season, which sometimes gets the short end of the stick. So, let's talk about it.

Advent, as a word, comes to us from the Latin and means, "Coming." During this season we sometimes speak about a three-fold coming or Christ (or advents). The first was when Jesus came in the flesh for us. By His birth, His fulfillment of the Commandments, and His sacrificial death for us, Jesus secured for us forgiveness and eternal life. His second coming will be when He returns in glory to raise the dead, render judgment, and bring us and all believers in Christ into the New Heaven and the New Earth. Even as we await our Lord's return on the clouds, as Christians we confess that He comes to us now in His Word and in His Sacraments. Through these, we receive the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. Advent, as a season, celebrates all these things. It is a penitential season, which means we are little more reflective than usual on our need for salvation in Christ, even as we know our hope will come.

In the Lutheran Church we also gather more frequently during Advent than we might otherwise, adding Wednesday services to our normal Sunday ones. Services at St. John's will be held on December 8th and 22nd, both at 7pm. You are welcome to join us! The services on the 1st and the 15th will be at our sister congregation, Grace Lutheran, in Jesup. If you would like to join us for our Christmas Eve service, which includes our children's program, that will also be at 7pm here in Fairbank. I invite to join me in prayer this month, that the Lord would grant to us and to His whole Church on earth, a blessed and hopeful Advent season and a joyful Christmastide.

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# Fairbank Fall UTV Ride & Poker Run a huge success

The Fairbank Fall UTV Ride & Poker Run was held on Saturday, November 6th. The bi-annual fund raising event is organized by JJ Little, Matthew Myers and Austin Kane. This ride raised almost \$13,000 which included a generous donation from the Carson McGrane Memorial Foundation, with 100% of the proceeds going to the Little Island Day Care in Fairbank to help out with their expansion and remodeling project.

There were approximately 180 units and over 500 people that took part in the ride. The event started at the Fairbank American Legion with stops at Boyd's Bar, Costa's Sports Bar & Grill, the Oran Tap, The Bank in Westgate, Fat Boys Saloon in Hazelton, Arlington Community Center, Leroy's in Aurora, Barney's in Wadena, and Rod & Cal's in Strawberry Point.

The group ended up back at the Fairbank Legion around 5 p.m. There were prizes handed out for the best 5 poker hands, thanks to all of the bars along the route that donated gift cards and other items. There was also a 50/50 drawing and approximately 30 items donated for the Silent Auction. The Little Island Day Care held a walking taco stand and later their was DJ music provided by "Little Accoustics and Sounds."

The Silent Auction items were donated by several local businesses and individuals, including: Poet, Little Property Management, Etringer Electric, Fairbank Plumbing & Heating, Visions Salon, Refuel, Steve & Linda Myers, WCI Trucking, Ken & Lamar Little, Root, Jeff & Mary Gann, Matthew & Kali Myers, Gavin Marine, Fat Boy's Saloon, Brien & Diann Cross, Doug Cue, Modern Building Products, Dean & Karen French and AK Farms.

"Raising almost \$13,000 in an afternoon is something our community should be proud of," said J.J. Little. "We want to again say thanks to everyone who attended."

The organizers also held the annual "Festive in Fairbank Ugly Sweater Party" on November 27th with all of the proceeds going towards updating the Legion. The results of this project were too late to get in this issue, so we'll update you next month.

These events benefit not only Fairbank, but many communities in the surrounding area. 

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


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
