



2022 Child Care Challenge Awards

Fairbank and Jesup receive Child Care Grants to equal nearly \$750,000

Buchanan County Economic Development (BCEDC) is pleased to announce that two Buchanan County communities have received childcare grants to either expand already existing childcare facilities or build brand new. The two communities to receive the grants are Fairbank and Jesup. Fairbank will expand their already established Little Island Child Care Center while Jesup will be developing The Right Place Child Care, a new childcare center.

Little Island Child Care Center (LICC) of Fairbank is the recipient of a nearly \$475,000 grant. LICC will be expanding its current facility with a 40x44 extension to increase capacity by 30 childcare slots including 12 infant spaces. The addition includes three additional care and playrooms, two bathrooms, an expanded kitchen with industrial quality appliances, additional storage space and a work room located near the infant area to improve efficiency and safety. The expansion, with an increase of 6 additional childcare providers, will create more opportunities for parents with young children in need of childcare to be employed in local and regional businesses.

The Right Place Child Care of Jesup will receive the second grant totaling \$250,000. The Right Place Child Care was established to develop additional childcare to fill the need identified by two community surveys illustrating the gap in childcare availability. The goal of the group is to create a center that provides services for children 0-3 and partners with the existing childcare within the public school. Partnerships between the city of Jesup, Jesup Community Schools and The Right Place Childcare LLC would work to fill the childcare gaps that exist in this childcare desert.

The tireless efforts of the volunteers working for childcare in these communities and applying for grants like this is why Buchanan County is moving forward. These grants will allow Fairbank and Jesup to advance with their plans to provide and expand this key service for their community and the county. Wapsie Valley's Foster named Hall of Famer

Written by Gidal Kaiser sports@oelweindailyregister.com Longtime Wapsie Valley head coach Tony Foster has been named as a 2022 Iowa Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame honoree.

Foster led the Warriors to two Class A state championships (2007, 2012) and was 145-57 in 19 seasons and won nine district titles until his retirement after the 2020 season.

"It's an unbelievable honor, and I'm just humbled by the whole thing," Foster said Thursday. "Just thankful to all the people who were part of it, on the journey with me."

Wapsie went unbeaten in both 2007 (13-0) and 2012 (14-0) and fell in a Class A state semifinal in 2013 for its only loss of the season (12-1). The Warriors went 9-2 in his final season.

"We are extremely excited for coach Foster to be inducted with the 2022 IFBCA Hall of Fame class," Wapsie Valley Athletic Director Brett Bergman said. "It is a great honor to recognize such an amazing career.

"He and his wife Carol have given so much to Wapsie Valley and have impacted many generations of student athletes. We (Wapsie Valley) are/were extremely fortunate to have him as such a dedicated coach, teacher, and community member over the years."



A handful of plaudits came in from social media around the time of the announcement, including from a pair of regional coaches and a couple former players.

"The news of my dad making the Hall of Fame is extremely exciting," Duane Foster said. "Growing up and watching him from afar as he was an assistant and working his way up to the head coach, it was always evident that he had a passion for the game and the people he works with.

"He has always been the one person that I have looked up to and wanted to be like. I knew at an

early age I wanted to take after him and follow in his footsteps. He has always done things the right way and his teams emulate that. He is very deserving of the honor and we are all very proud of the work he has done."

A graduate of Des Moines North and Upper Iowa University, Foster coached junior high at Anthon-Oto and Wapsie Valley, junior varsity at Wapsie Valley, and the offensive line at Simpson College before taking over as head coach in Fairbank. He has been around the game for more than 40 years. His squads went unbeaten in the regular season five times and col-

The City is still seeking applicants for a part time Police Officer. In addition to that position, we are also seeking applicants for a Pool Manager for the Summer of 2022.






"Some authors are goofy, like that."

After I had finished writing the final draft of the historical novel, Gangster in Our Midst: Bookkeeper, lieutenant, and sometimes hitman for Al Capone (2017), my editor told me to change the name of the town. She said, "If you don't, people in your hometown will expect you to get every 'T' crossed and 'I' dotted – perfectly. It's a book of fiction, after all, she added, so you can name the town anything you want."

I took her advice and eventually came up with the name "Oxbow." From my research I knew Ojibway Indians had once frequented that part northeast



Iowa... Oxbow is an Ojibway means "a 'u-shaped bend in the course of a river." The name seemed a good fit. Still, on the copyright page, I noted the book was based on FAIRBANK, IOWA.

Still, the book's front cover initially had a pencil and ink sketch of Fairbank's main street from the early 1900s, compliments of the Rev. Scott Jans. He was among dozens of Fairbank locals who jumped in to help with this book. I've always appreciated that about small towns, now more than ever. Eventually I updated the cover (pictured). If you purchased the first edition, you have a priceless treasure.

It's been almost five years since I launched Gangster in Our Midst at the Fairbank Public Library in August 2017. Not surprisingly, my first novel didn't make it on The New York Times Best Sellers list. I was pleased when it won a 2019 Notable 100 Indie Book Award from Shelf Unbound book review magazine. The award informed me that my peers believed the year of effort I put into researching and writing the novel was noteworthy. I felt encouraged to keep writing.

There's a part of me that remains disappointed, however... Well, to put it more succinctly, I'm still waiting for the "other shoe to drop," so to speak.

My unspoken vision for Gangster in Our Midst was that readers would come from across the COUNTRY and GLOBE, those who were so charmed and captivated by the characters and the town that, when planning a visit to the area, they would build into their travels a day or two at FAIRBANK. (I guess the quote from the "Field of Dreams" movie, "If you build it, they will come," was probably what I had in mind.)

I imagined travelers arriving at the front desk of CITY HALL to eagerly inquire about whether a GANGSTER TOUR was available, hoping a map would clearly designate the location of sites like the COFFIN CAFÉ...MARSHAL DELANEY'S HOME...HOTEL WILTSE, etc.

Unquestionably, at least a few people would boldly ask about how to secure permission to climb the BELL TOWER of the LUTHERAN CHURCH for an

And surely one and all would walk up misty-eyed to some friendly LOCAL who happened along MAIN STREET that day to eagerly inquire: "Did you know LOUIE LA CAVA?"

Some authors are goofy like that--at least I am.

Once a month I check sites like Amazon.com, Goodreads.com, and others for BOOK REVIEWS. Reader comments are invaluable to authors, especially so for self-published books because most sales are online. Amazon reviews, in particular, can make or break shopper interest in a book.

Gangster in Our Midst is up to seventeen (17) reviews -- the algorithm would rise significantly with say, 200 reviews. Seventy-six percent (76%) gave the book a five-star rating. But who's counting, really?

As I write this month's column, I find myself reenergized to think that my DREAM for this novel may still happen...based on recent below BOOK RE-VIEW left by someone called "Diana":

"Even though the title of this book implies that it is a story about a gangster... and part of it certainly is... I think that the real story is about the small town to which he comes and goes. Snapshots of life. That's as close as I can come to accurately describing what it felt like to read this book."

"The story spans the lifetime of several characters. As each chapter unfolds, we are immediately welcomed into their experiences of small-town life. Just as the people change over time, so does the town. There is a curious maturity that we are privileged to watch unfold. But more than that, we are invited to take a walk down Main Street and be a part of it all. It's an emotional journey that is completely unexpected... and wonderful. Over the course of the story, we are invited to examine the connections that bind a place to its people, and the people to their home.

"When I began to read, I thought this would be a book about the inside workings of the titular gangster. Eagerly I read, hoping to get the skinny on him and his outfit. I was hoping to watch his crimes from the inside and watch the how the community endured under his influence. What I got was better. Reading this story, I was able to see inside the gangster himself. I was a witness to his thoughts as a "regular" person who loves his wife, supports his community, and delights in being an "average" person away from his "job". Ms. Passick skillfully uses individually distinctive dialect styles and vocabulary to help us enjoy a sensation of really getting to know the characters as people, as if we were sitting at the same table, riding in the same car, or standing near the same hunting blind while conversations float in and out of our ears."

"Reading this book gave me the sensation of watching the town pull out a photo book. I listened to it tell the story of the years it remembered, and the secrets it kept about the interesting, and sometimes unconventional people who lived there. As time marched on, the town reflected the distinct experiences of each soul and how living side-by-side impacted each of them in very different ways. The story was brisk and unpredictable, making it a genuinely enjoyable read."


In November 2021, I published a second historical novel in the Gangster Series, The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse, Murder on the Prairie. This book tells the forgotten legacy of an Iowa pioneer, Dr. Wiltse-who, in the mid-1850s, left behind his beloved ancestral home in Ontario, Canada with his family to re-establish roots in the newly settled state of Iowa. It's an era of Indian massacres, mob hangings, and prairie banditti-many of whom become his enemies...and patients. But it's his affinity for murder investigation that puts Dr. Wiltse in the middle of a horrific murder, which makes newspaper headlines across northeastern Iowa and beyond. The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse is a prequel to Gangster in Our Midst. The book is a period piece that not only tells northeast Iowa's earliest pioneer history but illuminates northern attitudes toward slavery when Civil War erupts across the nation in 1860. Iowa celebrates 175 years of statehood in 2022.

I'm hoping (again) this second novel will motivate people to visit FAIRBANK...though this time, locals shouldn't be surprised if visitors keep one eye skyward, looking for big, black CROWS.

I'm grateful to everyone who purchases either of these books, reads them, and posts a book review. Both are available from independent books stores and Amazon.com. I have yet to designate an organization as the recipient of a donation from The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse book sales – to be announced soon. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.
