

Wapsie Valley School Board names Chris Hoover next District Superintendent

The Wapsie Valley Community School District School Board has named Chris Hoover as the district's next superintendent. As superintendent of the Maquoketa Community School District since 2014, Hoover has planned and facilitated multiple largescale building projects and led major initiatives and change efforts for the district. He has also collaborated with service providers and community partners to enhance teaching and learning throughout the schools.

As a district leader, Hoover has placed a focus on communication, ensuring that parents, staff, students, and community members are thoroughly informed of the challenges and opportunities of their local schools.

Before his time in Maquoketa, Hoover served as the shared superintendent of the Turkey Valley and South Winneshiek CSDs, where he sustained a school culture and instructional programs conducive to student learning and staff professional development. He also was a principal in the Nodaway Valley CSD.

Hoover holds a master of education degree from the University of Northern Iowa and a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Upper Iowa University. He received his superintendent certification from UNI.

The School Board has been working with Grundmeyer Leader Services to conduct the search. The board conducted a first round of interviews February 2 and held interviews with the three finalists February 8.

Hoover will officially begin leading the Wapsie Valley Community School District on July 1, 2022.



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The American Civil War and Pvt. John H. Ford (1831-1863)

The opening chapter of The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse, Murder on the Prairie (2021) chronicles what was likely the experience of Dr. Alexander Wiltse and his family as they left behind their beloved Wiltsetown, Ontario, Canada in the mid-1850s, and boarded the first of several steamers that would deliver them to their new homeland of America.

Like most immigrants, they emigrated in the hope of making a better life for themselves. Reaching Chicago, the Wiltses joined a wagon caravan that would take them to the prairies of northeastern Iowa. According to the History of Buchanan County, Iowa (1881), they resided with relatives on a farm at Colesburg their first years in the state.

Iowa had become a state in 1846, and settlers were going about the business of establishing farms and building the young state. As soon as Dr. Wiltse arrived, he likely began treating settlers suffering from sickness and disease. Indians, prairie banditti, and chicken thieves, too, became his clients. Additionally, when a corpse was found along a riverbed, authorities called upon Dr. Wiltse to aid in the murder investigation.

The nation was just recovering from the Panic of 1857-1858 when the American Civil War broke out. Northeast Iowans would have learned of the Confederate attack on the Union-held Fort Sumpter near Charleston, South Carolina through the Buchanan Country Guardian (1858-1864).

Republican Abraham Lincoln had been elected as the 16th President of the United States of America in November 1860. He ran on a platform of opposing the institution of slavery but was not an abolitionist.

Slaves fueled the cotton and tobacco plantations of the south, and Southerners feared the election of Lincoln would lead to the abolition of slavery.

In December, under the leadership of former Senator Jefferson Davis, South Carolina became the first state to secede from the Union. Six more southern states seceded during the winter of 1860 and spring of 1861. Calling themselves the Confederate States of America, the secessionists claimed that according to the Constitution every state had the right to leave the Union. President Lincoln claimed that they did not have that right.

After the Confederate attack on Fort Sumpter, the United States Government proceeded to act at once, and President Lincoln, under authority of the law of 1795 giving the President power to call out the militia in case of insurrection, immediately issued a call for 75,000 men for three months' service.

It was expected the main Federal army would march on the main Confederate army before summer, win the ensuing battle, take Richmond, Virginia, serving as the capital of the Confederacy, and quickly put down the rebellion.

The real seriousness and extent of the war was realized in July 1861 at the disaster at Bull Run, when Federal and Confederate armies clashed near Manassas Junction, Virginia, resulting in a disastrous defeat of Federal troops. A few days later, Congress authorized the enlistment of 500,000 men.

Not a soldier from Iowa was at Bull Run, but this news incited and urged fathers, sons, brothers, and husbands from all walks of life to a more determined resolve to save the Union. Initially, the newly elected Iowa Governor Samuel Kirkwood was uncertain if the state could raise the number of volunteers necessary to meet its quota, but enough men enlisted to



form ten regiments. In total, Iowa would furnish 48 infantry regiments, 9 cavalry regiments, and 4 batteries of artillery. Iowa also furnished one black regiment and a thousand replacement troops.

John H. Ford was among the Buchanan County men whom I tracked to tell this portion of the story of The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse. On August 6, 1861, at age thirty, Ford enlisted and on the twenty-fifth of September mustered into service as a private in the Co C, 9th Iowa Infantry.

Details of the 9th Regiment activities are well documented in Buchanan County history...from guarding railroads to engaging in battles against the Confederacy. Iowans largely fought in the western Confederate states of Missouri, Arkansas, Mississippi, and Tennessee. The 9th Regiment saw their bloodiest fighting in May 1863 during the siege of Vicksburg, Tennessee.

In the book, A Chain of Thunder: A Novel of the Siege of Vicksburg, author Jeff Shaara described the battle over the vaunted "Gibraltar of the Confederacy." Union soldiers had forced the remnants of Confederate Lieutenant General John C. Pemberton's army to retreat to Vicksburg, burning the bridges over the Big Black River in its path. But after sustaining heavy casualties in two failed assaults against the rebels, Union soldiers were losing confidence and morale was low. Grant reluctantly decided to lay siege to the city, trapping soldiers and civilians alike inside an iron ring of Federal entrenchments. Six weeks later, the starving and destitute Southerners finally surrendered, yielding command of the Mississippi River to the Union forces on July 4.

Together, with the Union victory at Gettysburg just a day before, Vicksburg marked a turning point in the fortunes of the Union army. A Union victory at Port Hudson five days later, the Union controlled the entire Mississippi River, and the Confederacy was split in half. Pvt. Ford was wounded during the Vicksburg campaign requiring amputation of his right leg, per a report published by Capt. E. C. Little in the Buchanan Country Guardian, June 9, 1863. He died June 24, likely from an amputation-related infection. His body was buried in a mass grave along with the other 766 Union soldiers killed; another 3,793 were wounded and 276 captured or missing. The confederacy had 32,697 casualties, with 3,202 of the casualties killed, wounded or missing.

In April 1865, commander of the Confederate troops Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered to Gen. Grant

at the Appomattox Court House, Virginia. Five days later – President Lincoln was assassinated, but it would be more than sixteen months before President Andrew Johnson would declare a formal end to the conflict in August 1866.

Dr. Wiltse reportedly treated several soldiers who returned home from war. Their physical afflictions included gunshot wounds, diseases, syphilis and gonorrhea.

A white marble marker (photo: Larry K) at the Fairbank Cemetery commemorates Pvt. Ford's Civil War service to preserve the Union. It's uncertain why his name is not inscribed as one of 56 soldiers on the granite Civil War Monument erected in 1911 at Veteran's Park in Fairbank. Pvt. Ford left a wife, Esther (Baker) Ford, and a young daughter, Alice (1854-1939), both of whom are buried at Flake Cemetery, Barryton, Mecosta County, Michigan.

President Lincoln's hand-written notes reflect his evolving attitude about slavery throughout his presidency. On January 1, 1863, he finally issued the "The Emancipation Proclamation," freeing all slaves in the Confederacy, believing "a house divided cannot stand." The Thirteenth Amendment to the Constitution was passed and ratified on December 6, 1865, to "terminate and forever prohibit" slavery and involuntary servitude in the United States.

The Civil War represents the largest human catastrophe in American history.

• One million soldiers were wounded or died in the conflict. Lacking antibiotics, for every three soldiers killed in battle, five more died of infection and disease.

• One in thirteen surviving soldiers returned home was missing one or more limbs.

• Many were addicted to laudanum (opium), commonly used to treat pain.


• The condition of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) first started to be recognized as "Soldier's Heart." The war led to a rise in awareness of veterans' needs.

• Pre-war jobs on farms or in factories became impossible or nearly so. For many, however, there was no solution, and tens of thousands of families slipped into destitution.

• The increased responsibility and social power for women came into being.

In the end, the Civil War solved a few of the America's extremely pressing issues, but many social and economic issues remain with us today.

The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse, Murder on the Prairie is a period piece of Iowa's earliest history, particularly relevant as Iowa celebrates 175 years of statehood in 2022. The novel is available through local libraries, bookstores, or Amazon.com (type into Google: The Black Bag of Dr. Wiltse, Betty Brandt Passick).

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Grace to you and peace from God the Father and our Lord, Jesus Christ!

I apologize for my absence from this paper lately. Sometimes, as the Psalmist says, "my cup runneth over." I am thankful, however, that the Lord granted me a restful vacation and deliverance from illness so that I might be with you again this month. I'd like us to consider for a moment the season of Lent as, by the time you are reading this, it will have started. Ash Wednesday marks the start of this period of the Christian Year. This year Ash Wednesday is (was) March 2nd.


As Jesus was approaching Jerusalem for the final time before His death, He took His disciples aside and said to them, "Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and all the things that are written by the prophets concerning the Son of man shall be accomplished. For he shall be delivered unto the Gentiles, and shall be mocked, and spitefully entreated, and spitted on: And they shall scourge him, and put him to death: and the third day he shall rise again." (Luke 18:31-33 KJV) Very specifically, Jesus predicted what would happen to Him in Jerusalem. He would be betrayed, mocked, and humiliated. He would be spit upon and, after being flogged, He would be crucified. Jesus taught later exactly why these things would happen - so that, "repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations." (Lk. 24:47)

Lent is the season in the Church Year where we more intentionally consider all our Lord's work for us. We consider our sinfulness, to be sure, but especially we ponder the Lord's great love for us - such that He was willing to suffer most horribly so that our sins might be forgiven, and we be rescued from death and eternal condemnation. As part of this deeper consideration, it is common in many Christian denominations to fast during this 40-day period. Some refrain from eating meat, others from all animal products. Others refrain from favorite activities. The motivation for this fasting is not so much to earn favor from God but use that time - which was used in service to ourselves - to pray, read the Bible, or serve our neighbor.

In the Lutheran church, it is common during Lent to have additional worship services. Here at St. John's, we'll be having services on Wednesdays at 7pm - in addition to Sunday - between now and Easter. These added services offer us the opportunity for a spiritual workout as we spend more time in God's Word than we would in any other time of the year. They also serve by preparing us to celebrate Easter with a true joy. Some of the Bible readings in Lent are challenging because they call to mind what sinful things we have done and what good things we have failed to do. Thankfully, they also point us to all that Christ bore for us.

Lent is a 40-day period where Christians more deeply consider Jesus' life and death for us. Then, at the end of those 40 days, comes Easter. May Lord the Lord grant us each a blessed Lent, that we may celebrate His Easter in sincerity and truth.
