

"The Rolla and Lucy King Family of Fairbank"


Interview Russ Toothman, son of Ira Toothman and Dora King Toothman - Rolla Winslow King, and Lucy King's grandson, who currently resid-

Grandpa Rolla Winslow King was born June 14, 1894 in Fairbank. His parents were Winslow J. King (1859-1933) and Sarah Althelia King (1861-1935). They married in 1887. Winslow had two brothers: Ray Lee King (1891-1971) and Roo-

sevelt Neil King (1903-1966),who by the name "Neil." (Photo: Ray, Winslow, Sarah, Rolla.



facts about his grandfather's

life. In 1917, he joined the U.S. Armyduring World War I and became part of the Iowa Pvt Co I 327 Infantry, departing from Camp Dodge in Des Moines in October. He found a little history about the Division on the internet. The Division

embarked to northern France, arriving in early spring 1918. The 327th Infantry moved online at the end of summer making it one of the first American units to see combat at St. Mihiel. This was the first operation in World War I conducted entirely by American forces. The Regiment then occupied defensive positions on the Lorraine Front in eastern France.

"It's interesting to know Grandpa Rolla was involved in such a premier military

At the war's end, he returned home and secured work in the baggage house at the Chicago Great Western railroad in Oelwein. At some point, Grandpa Rolla got hired by the Fairbank Post Office, working during busy periods and vacation throughout the year.

In 1924, he married Margret Lucy Michelson (1894-1977) in Fairbank. Largely, he and "Lucy" resided in a two-story slate-sided red house that sat a block west of the Fairbank railroad depot. Three children were born in the years that followed: Dora Lee King Toothman (1924-2005), Rolla King Jr., born in 1933, and Ray King (1936-2006). Russ remembers many Friday nights traveling to Grandma Lucy and Grandpa Rolla's house. "The drive from our home in Elk Run Heights, Iowa was relatively short, but I always enjoyed looking for the farm where minks were raised... It

meant we were about halfway there," he and rolling a cigarette. The porch had a

"My sister Carol and I got to sleep upstairs sometimes... It was great. There was a room that was used for storage, and I could rummage through all the stuff: old fly rod fishing poles, old pictures, and other odds and ends. In the morning, I would find Grandpa outside by the

back porch having coffee

hand water pump, and if there were minnows for fishing in the barrel by the back door, he would let me pump up some fresh water into that barrel," he added.

Of course, Russ vividly remembers the "outhouse." How can one ever forget such a smelly place?



The ICCAC recently announced the Division II Men's Golf All-Region Awards, including the 2022 Division II Player and Coach of the Year. Kirkwood led the way this year in both the Coach & Player of the Year award after winning the 2022 North Central District Championship.

The Region XI Division II Men's Golf Coach of the Year award this year went to Darin Pint of Kirkwood. Darin is the son of Don and Karen Pint of Fairbank, and was a 1990 graduate at Wapsie Valley High School. He is a member of the NJCAA Men's Golf Hall of Fame, and led Kirkwood to their seventh consecutive NJCAA qualifying championship this spring, and 16th in the past 18 seasons.

Starting off the list of First Team All-Region selections was this year's Region XI Division II Men's Golf Player of the Year, Brandon McCarty of Kirkwood. McCarty, a freshman, had eight top-5 finishes this season and two victories, including a runner-up finish at the Park University Spring Classic. His score counted for team scores in 21 of 22 tournaments.

Another Kirkwood player also receiving First Team honors was freshman Kolby Shackelford. But the honors didn't stop there. Freshman Luke Evans was named to the 2nd Team All-Region, and freshmen JD Pollard and Kyle Arthofer made the Honorable Mention All-Region.

Recently the team placed 5th in the NJCAA Division II Championship Tournament in Joplin, MO.

"Katie worked tirelessly to manage events on Purdue's campus and in the community. I am beyond thrilled to join the Board in praising Katie for her exemplary work over the past year."

Egloff is a former Wapsie Valley graduate and is currently the Assistant Athletics Director for Event Management at Purdue University. She is responsible for oversight of the event management department while also serving as the department's Title IX coordinator. This past year, Purdue's football team saw its first nine-win season since 2003, which resulted in the most fans at Ross-Ade Stadium since the Drew Brees era. Coupled with staffing shortages across the country, Egloff had to get creative at all football games with stadium security and the shortage.



In addition, Egloff oversaw the introduction of ParkHub in game day parking lots throughout the year which resulted in football and basketball's highest-ever parking revenue. Overall, Purdue hosted and Egloff oversaw events such as NCAA Volleyball, NCAA Soccer, and the B1G Swimming and Diving Championships in 2022. Egloff was also an integral part of the execution of the 2021 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, assisting with hosting a portion of its events at Mackey Arena.

Grandpa Rolla had an old wooden rowboat that he kept on the shore by Island Park. Uncle Rolla or Uncle Ray would row the boat up the river, and the three of them fished for crappies for hours using cane poles.

Uncle Rolla and Uncle Ray took Russ to the Wapsie River one summer afternoon to teach him to swim. After successfully coaching him from one side of the river to the other, the two men quickly swam back to the opposite side then began to holler at him that it was time to go home. Russ realized it was either swim or walk home - he managed to dog paddle his way back across the river.

Sometimes the three of them played baseball, using the barn for a backstop. In 1950 the railroad installed a light warning system at the point where the tracks intersected with Highway 281, about one hundred yards from the house. The railroad determined the barn prevented a clear view of the light and said the barn had to come down. It was still standing in 1956 when Grandpa Rolla died.

During hunting season, they took Russ squirrel hunting. He got his first squirrel when he was 8 years old and was very proud of that accomplishment. Next, they invited him to go pheasant hunting, and finally, they taught him how to trap muskrat and mink. They had to get up early - at 4 am -- to go check the traps.

Some weekends they traveled to the Mississippi River by McGregor to hunt ducks. "I still swear I shot a duck with my 410 shotgun when I was 9 years old, but Uncle Ray always argued that he had shot it. Truth is, we shot at the same time," Russ admitted.

Sometime in the early 1950s, Uncle Rolla and Uncle Ray joined the U.S. Army and left to fight in Korea. Russ missed them a lot the couple years they were away. In the early 1960s the two brothers bought a bakery in Pella, Iowa. Russ worked for them one summer -- by then he was sixteen. Sometime over the next few years, the brothers bought a resort in Sioux Narrows, Ontario, Canada. Russ recalls the summer his dad Ira took his family of four on vacation to the resort. "Uncle Ray gave me the boat ride of a lifetime on Lake of the Woods."

Russ spent a lot of time with Grandma Lucy, too. He accompanied her when she cleaned houses on the west side of the river. They always walked the dozen or so blocks on the mornings she was scheduled to clean. "I learned that my mother Dora was born in one of those houses," he not-

On the way home, they would stop at a store where Grandma would buy him a toy airplane kit, and as soon as he reached home, he assembled the wooden pieces and glued them to-

He and Grandma Lucy also spent many hours side-by-side, planting and tending the large garden east of the house. When the peas were ready for harvest, she let him eat peas right out of the pod, plus one or two carrots he pulled from the warm, black dirt at his feet. Of course, part of his garden memory included watching Grandpa Rolla hitch a horse to a plow that turned the soil in the spring.

One day Great Uncle Neil brought home the pistol he carried at his job at the railroad in Oelwein. Grandma Lucy raised a fit, stating she would not have it in her house. especially with me, a 7-year-old present. Russ pointed out: "Remember: This was in the 1950s."

Rolla Winslow King died in 1956 at age 62, when Russ was ten years old. His most prominent memory is of hearing the American Legion play 'Taps" over his grave. To this day, Russ sheds a tear whenever he hears that military song being played.

Lucy King lived until 1977. She was 82 when she died. They are buried in the Fairbank Cemetery.

The house was torn down around 2009. It had to be one of the oldest houses in Fairbank.



Welcome June – It's strawberry time! There is nothing better than f me-grown strawberries to make and serve in many ways as in this Fre Strawberry Pie or the strawberry pie recipe printed in last July's paper.

FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE

- 1 baked pie shell
- 1 quart fresh strawberries
- 1 cup sugai
- 3 tbsp. cornstartch



Cover the baked pie shell with strawberries cut in half (cut side touching the pie shell Cover the baked pie shell with strawberries cut in half (cut side touching the pie shell). In medium saucepan, mash the remaining strawberries and combine with sugar. Place over medium heat and bring to a boil, stirring frequently. In a small bowl, whisk together the cornstarch and water. Gradually pour into boiling strawberries. Reduce heat and simmer until thickened, stirring constantly, about 6-8 minutes. Pour mixture over berries in the pie shell. Chillseveral hours. Serve with whipped topping or ice cream with a fresh strawberry garnish.

Macaroni and Cheese is an old favorite for years. There are many recipe variations and certainly a wide variety of packaged mixes. I still like this old-fashioned cheesy recipe.



MACARONI AND CHEESE

3 tbsp. butter

2 tbsp. flour

8 oz. sharp cheddar cheese, shredded 1/4 tsp. pepper

½ tsp. garlic salt

Cook macaroni until al dente. In large saucepan, melt butter. Stir in flour and seasonings and cook 2 minutes or until bubbly, stirring constantly. Simmer over low heat 3-5 minutes or until thickened. Add 1 ½ cups cheese (saving ½ cup until later). Cook and stir 2-3 minutes until cheese is melted. Stir in cooked and drained macaroni. Spoon into 1 ½ quart casserole that was sprayed with cooking oil. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees or until heated through.

NOTE: Feel free to use different cheeses or a combination of cheeses (Swiss Monterey Jack, Gouda, Paremson) along with the cheddar for a savory, more complex



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

REGULAR MEETING
The Fairbank City Council met in regular session on Monday, April 25, 2022. Mayor Harter called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM with the Pledge of Allegiance. Members present: R. Woods, Williams, Erickson, T. Woods, and Coffin. Absent: None. Also, present at City Hall: Heather Prendergast, Attorney; Brian Delagardelle, Wastewater Operator; Nick Kuker, Public Works; Brittany Fuller, City Clerk; and Michelle Laube, Deputy Clerk. Williams/Erickson to approve the agenda. Ayes: Five. Nays: None.

Kevin Bodensteiner, the Fairbank Fire Department's Assistant Fire Chief, was present to tell the council that the ambulance portion of the department had an inspection on April 1st and that they passed with flying colors. He also wanted to thank the council for adding an employee to the police team, Mitch Franck. Mitch was able to respond to a call quickly that past Sunday and he provided a patient with a lifesaving treatment before the ambulance arrived. Dean Mangrich was present to discuss the city selling river front property. He explained that the issue was addressed that last October and a decision had been made. His concerns included losing fishing and park space. He stated that he did not believe the city should sell to anyone and that there should be no further actions in that request.

Erickson/Coffin to approve the liquor license application for the Fairbank Development Corporation for Fair-

bank Days during June 22 – 25, 2022. Ayes: Five. Nays: None. Abstain: R. Woods and Williams.

Mayor Harter brought up the topic of selling land next to West Bentley Park along the river. He wanted to know if the council had any interests in selling. There is a party interested that owns land right next to that section along the river. Attorney Prendergast explained that if anyone wanted to put in an offer it could be reviewed under closed session. Then if an offer was accepted, the city would follow the disposing of land procedures which would include a public hearing. There was no action taken on this item.

Jon Biederman was present to give the council an update on the Main Street project. He went over plans and said that it looked like a public meeting was being planned for June 21st at the legion to provide residents in town the ability to ask questions and get information regarding this huge upcoming project. The bridge will be closed to traffic for a period, but they are planning to try and do the first section separately so that it could be opened and at least take traffic to First Street. Also sounds like pedestrians will still be able to cross the bridge by foot but no vehicle traffic. An official start date will be known more after December, depending on weather, but more than likely the project will affect the school year both in the spring and fall.

Max Kayser presented his project he chose to work on as part of the Wapsie Valley CAPS, Center for Advance Professional Studies, program through the High School. He chose to research and present his ideas for

lighting and beautification of Main Street to help with the upcoming Main Street project. The council thanked him for his hard work and his presentation.

At the last meeting, Chief Drish had asked the council about hiring a part-time investigator to help with any of the bigger cases they may encounter as a department. He asked the council to consider hiring Andrew Isley who currently works for the Independence Police Department. He stated that they would not go over on hours that were already approved and that this employee would be a tremendous help to the department. Williams/R. Woods to approve Resolution 2022-17 – Resolution Hiring Part-Time Police Department Investigator. Andrew Isley was hired at \$23.00 per hour and will be available as needed starting April 25, 2022. Ayes: Five. Nays: None.

T. Woods/Coffin to approve the purchase of a laptop, shot gun, and taser gun that are needed to update equipment for the Police Department. He will look more into pricing and information on the current tough book and will bring back to the council later. Ayes: Five. Nays:

None. Memorial trees were discussed. The office will get ahold of the 10 people wanting to donate for a memorial tree and coordinate a time with Ted Vorwald to get them planted. An individual is wanting to donate an 8-10-foot-tall Norway spruce. The council felt that would be great at the ball diamond. Coffin/Erickson to approve the purchase of 10 trees for memorial trees along with rings and a plaque for \$200.00 per tree from

As the weather gets nicer, Mayor Harter wanted to remind the council to pay attention to properties needing cleaned up. Abatements and nuisances need to be documented and addressed.

The roof on the gazebo located at Riverside Parheeds repaired after the damage it received during the storm last summer. Ted Vorwald was still working on obtaining some quotes for the different options available This will be up for a decision at a future meeting.

Discussion was held on the code updates and the sections still needing reviewed.

Chief Drish said he was proud of the department and proud of Mitch Frank for his actions while attending that call on Sunday. He updated the council on a few things the department had been working on and is looking to get business cards and door hangers made. Brian said that public works had been busy getting the damaged box back from being painted and fixed and wired on the truck. He said that Nick Kuker passed his pool examand they cleaned up the parks that past week.
